A Word from the Executive Director

Good evening everyone and welcome to Daughters of Israel's 104th Annual Meeting. Wow, I cannot believe that three years has flown by since I was standing in this same spot delivering my first report as the newly-appointed Executive Director of Daughters. My, how time flies! And who would think that we were able to accomplish so much in a three-year span. As proud as I feel of our achievements thus far, managing a nursing home and ensuring its quality and growth is a never-ending job. There is always still so much to do with new projects and initiatives in the pike. As Oliver Wendell Holmes remarked, "The great thing in the world is not so much where we stand, as in what direction we are moving."

Let's start with a quick recap... One of our major accomplishments this past year has been the rapid growth of our state-of-the-art sub-acute facility. Last year, I reported on the first six months of operations for our short-term sub-acute unit. This unit is now in full swing, averaging 28 patients per day. Since opening in October, 2009, this unit has had 461 admissions and 243 discharges either back to home or alternate living facility.

We are extremely pleased with our new partnership with RehabCare who provides our rehabilitation services and is enabling us to expand our offerings to meet our rapid growth. We continue to aggressively market this unit in many different ways. Watch for our exciting new billboard advertising campaign touting our sub-acute facility. The first billboard appeared right after the 4th of July in West Orange at the intersection of Pleasant Valley Way and Mt. Pleasant Ave.

We are still reaping the benefits of our Joan Hamburg radio campaign, with one recent admission that resulted directly from this advertising! We also ask for your help - our Board, family and friends - please continue to spread the word about these services to your constituents. There is nothing more compelling than a firsthand recommendation.

Please keep in mind that our sub-acute unit is THE profit center for our Home. With drastic reductions in Medicaid and Medicare reimbursements as well as a further decline in our UJC allocations, we must continue to cultivate and grow this unit within our Home, which will help us steer through challenging times. We are exploring the concept of outpatient sub-acute therapy as an additional offering as well as other strategic plans to provide alternate revenue streams to our Home.

We have been extremely busy with refurbishments and renovations over these past three years, updating and beautifying the living spaces at our Home to provide the residents with the most pleasurable and aesthetically appealing environment possible.

These include:

- Renovations to the Barnhard Pavilion corridors, dining room and living room, which included new flooring, wall coverings, handrails and new furnishings. We will soon begin renovations to this unit's nurses' station and kitchen area as well. Our grant proposal to The Healthcare Foundation of NJ for renovations to the nurses' station and physician's consultation room was approved for \$86,000 for this project. Thank you so much to The Healthcare Foundation of NJ for your continued support of our Home.
- A complete overhaul of the Alta & Janet Cohen Auditorium/Levin-Ball Family Hall, from top to bottom. The auditorium is now an impressive and beautiful space in which we are proud to host events for our residents and the greater community, all thanks to a generous donation from the Levin Family Foundation.
- Dedication of the commemorative paver patio, renamed the Aaron & Sarah Franzblau Paver Patio thanks to a generous donation from Sarah Franzblau.
- A spruce-up to the Women's League Gift Shop.
- Extensive outdoor landscaping and repaving of the driveway and parking lot.
- Replacement of the fire alarm system.
- Lobby refurbishment, including new carpet, furniture and a fireplace to create a more home-like and intimate environment.
- Preliminary projections for installation of a full building sprinkler system.
- Continued enhancements of our technology infrastructure, with a focus on WiFi access.
- Refurbishments to the common areas at the Bierman Home.

Keeping up with a building of this size and age is a never-ending task. We are a non-profit and must work very diligently to finance all of these refurbishments. As I mentioned earlier, the State Medicaid reimbursement system changed during this past year, and although our overall dollar figure reimbursement did not alter dramatically, future adjustments are still very much unknown. The Federal government is constantly looking at ways to balance their budget (who isn't these days???) and will be making modifications in their reimbursement methodologies as well. Our reliance on our fundraising efforts is of utmost importance due to the unknowns in our reimbursements and our allocation. Thank you



to all who have supported our Home over the years and continue to do so. The wonderful things we accomplish for our seniors would not be possible without the community's generosity.

I, of course, do not accomplish all of the wonderful things here at Daughters unilaterally. First and foremost, I have been so fortunate to work with a

wonderful President. Jan, you became President with a brand new Executive Director... how brave of you! You are one of a kind! You present a unique portrait of brilliance and wit, grace and kindness. I am grateful for your unwavering patience, upbeat humor, endless listening, solid advice, and consultations. We have collaborated, learned from one another, and we have shared many visions, many of which we saw to completion! Jan, words cannot express my gratitude to you. And while I am very much looking forward to working with Marsha, who possesses her own unique talents, I will sorely miss you! I am honored that I was able to begin my journey as Executive Director with you!

And Marsha, I really am so excited to continue this journey with you! From the Rabbi's Study...

We are all well familiar with the commandment that G-d gave our first patriarch Avraham. G-d commanded that Avraham and his ensuing descendants were to circumcise every male on the eighth day from his birth as a sign of the covenant between the Almighty and His people. Furthermore, Avraham needed to circumcise the men in his household as well as himself to enable them all to "enter the fold." The Torah tells us that Avraham did just that at the age of ninety-nine.

Directly following these events, the Torah relates that Avraham was sitting at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. As he was sitting there, G-d appeared to him. Citing a Talmudic source, Rashi explains that the time that this incident took place was on the third day following Avraham's circumcision. The purpose of G-d's visit was to do *Bikur Cholim*, to visit the sick.

We learn from this incident that G-d Himself performed this important *Chesed*, act of kindness, of visiting the sick.

Now, one would naturally assume that an adult who underwent a major surgery should have been in bed, recuperating from it. Such was not the case with Avraham. In lieu of resting, he was sitting at the doorway of his tent during the hours

of the day when the sun's heat was most intense. His purpose was to be on the outlook for any passerbyers he could invite into his home as guests. In fact, Avraham's tent opened on all four sides in order for him not to miss out on any potential guests that might be coming from any direction.

Commenting on the phrase in the text "in the heat of the day," Rashi tells us that the Almighty purposely caused the intense sun that day to ensure that there would be no one out walking, and that Avraham would not be bothered with any guests. G-d was trying to promote an environment in which Avraham could just rest and heal from his surgery. However, when G-d observed that Avraham had become distraught and despondent that there was nobody whom he could invite into his home and serve, He realized that He needed to approach the situation differently. That is when He decided to bring the three angels in the guise of mortal men to visit Avraham.



In viewing this incident from a conceptual perspective, we find that at first G-d, acting as a caretaker, addressed the physical needs of the patient, by promoting an opportunity for him to rest. It's as if G-d was assuming a role akin to that of a modern day nurse. However, He reversed Himself when He saw the extreme distress and anguish that the patient displayed. The patient was unable to do something that meant so much to him and that helped to define his very essence as a person. G-d decided that meeting Avraham's emotional and spiritual needs outweighed focusing on his physical needs.

At that point, it's as if G-d saw himself in the role of a chaplain.

The chaplain addresses the emotional and spiritual needs of the patients/residents that he visits. He recognizes that this dimension can be a critical part of the resident's well being. Of course, addressing the physical needs of a patient is essential to promote and achieve healing. But, we cannot underestimate the critical aspects of the emotional and spiritual dimension that is part and parcel of the healing process as well.

DOI Scores A+ on Family Satisfaction Surveys

Every year, the Administration Department at Daughters of Israel conducts a Family Satisfaction Survey of family members of all residents of the Home. The survey consists of 31 questions that address all departments including Dining, Housekeeping, Nursing, Maintenance, Social Services, etc. The Continuous Quality Improvement Committee of the Home, which is comprised of the Administration and Department Heads, reviews the survey results and identifies areas for improvement. For areas that need improvement, action plans are developed and interventions are monitored. We are pleased to announce that our most recent survey has shown improvement in almost all areas. The overall average of all questions, which are answered on a scale of 1 to 5, with 5 being the highest level of satisfaction, has shown an all time high of 4.30, compared to last year which was 4.20. As a matter of fact, the survey has shown a steady increase over the past 8 years from 3.75 to its current score of 4.30.



Other surveys that are conducted in the Home include a Short Term Stay survey and a telephone survey for residents in the week following their discharge.

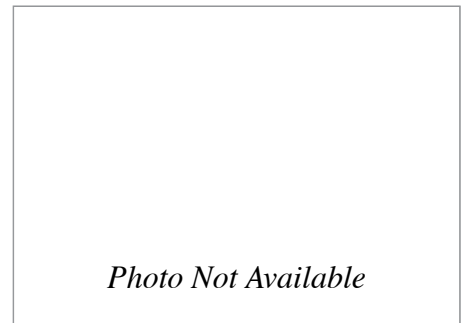

DOI Nurse & Ambassador of Goodwill Impacts Lives

There are extraordinary people who walk in our midst but do so quietly and humbly. One of these people is Lydia Stanislaus, RN and nursing supervisor at Daughters of Israel, where she has worked for over 10 years.

While many of us choose to spend our vacation time unwinding on a beach, sailing on a cruise or sightseeing, Lydia chose to spend her vacation time volunteering on a medical mission to Grenada, her native country, with the Grenada NY Adventist Organization.

Lydia, who departed on July 2, 2011, was among a group of other healthcare professional volunteers, who sponsored their own flights and expenses. Many of the medical supplies, including syringes, oxygen tubing, staple removers and gauze pads, were generously donated by Daughters of Israel in a gesture to demonstrate support for her good will efforts. In addition, staff members individually contributed to her trip.

During the one-week mission, Lydia travelled to medical clinics in the countryside and other locales, which are remote from the Island's three hospitals. Lydia's goals were two-fold. First, she distributed the much-needed medical supplies to these remote clinics. In particular, there is a shortage of syringes which are costly in Grenada, and she oversaw the clinics' distribution of these supplies to diabetics. The second goal was for Lydia and her group to hold health fairs to educate the impoverished population about the two leading diseases facing the country, cancer and diabetes. The fairs offered glucose testing, prostate screenings, and blood pressure checks, among other services.

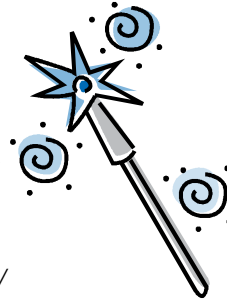
